Dear House of Prayer family and friends,

When my daughter Hannah took Henry for his pre-kindergarten assessment last September, the teacher had a list of items to assess, and she also had some small colored blocks on the table where they were meeting, just to see what each child might do with them. While the teacher and Hannah were chatting, Henry was busy with the blocks. He said innocently to the teacher, "Do you know what a pattern is? I've been making a pattern with these blocks." The teacher found Henry quite well prepared for kindergarten.

We Christians know what a pattern is, too. We experience it in the circle of the church year. An old year ends, and a new one begins. The pattern is always the same: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost, then a long green and growing season that brings us to Christ the King – and then we start all over again. It provides a familiar, dependable rhythm when life takes us to unfamiliar places or when chaos seems to reign.

Advent is a bit of a mismatch to the world's way of getting ready for Christmas, so we might sometimes feel out of sync with the shopping/wrapping/baking/entertaining craziness that can descend on us. That's especially true if we're dealing with financial or other challenges that drain our energy or with health issues of our own or for someone we love. Perhaps especially this year, Advent will be just the right season for us. Zechariah, Elizabeth, Joseph, and Mary will be good companions along the way.

At various times when I've been on eight-day silent retreats, a spiritual director has suggested I "go spend some time" with someone we know from scripture. It's often Jesus, but years ago a director said, "Go spend some time with Mary in the stable. Let her hand you the baby Jesus." It was a "just go see what happens" suggestion that evoked a very moving and comforting experience that's still vivid. I hadn't been sure how to do what he had suggested, but a quiet place with no distractions, an openness to whatever might come, and a willingness to let my mind wander down a suggested path might serve you well, too. Maybe Zechariah, Elizabeth, Joseph or Mary found themselves in situations that resonate with yours right now.

Maybe you could spend some time with Zechariah, remembering how he had questions for God but got no answers. Ask him, "How did you get through that time when God was silent? And how did you end up offering God nothing but praise?"

Or maybe you could spend some time with Elizabeth, noticing that her life got turned upside down – in a good way, to be sure, but still, it must

have been hard to adjust. Ask her, "How did you come through something you never expected would happen in your life? How did you deal with growing older?"

Or maybe you could ask Joseph, "What saw you through a confusing time when things felt out of your control? How did you come through that?"

Or maybe you, too, could go spend some time with Mary in the stable, and you could let her hand the baby Jesus to you.

If this all sounds a little strange to you, consider that we believe in the communion of saints, so, in some non-local, non-temporal way, we're all in this life of faith together. We're all on this year's Advent journey together, so we might as well enjoy the wisdom and the good company of faithful people whose lives were changed by their encounters with God or God's messengers.

If spending time with Zechariah, Elizabeth, Joseph or Mary doesn't seem like a way for you to come to know God better, you might have coffee or dinner or a phone conversation with someone whose faith is an inspiration or an example for you. Spend a little time with them. You could ask them how their faith has seen them through hard times or ask them what about their faith brings them joy or comfort or peace of mind and heart. Whether you get together with companions from scripture or from your past or present life, know that one of the best ways to know God better is to spend time with God's friends. That might be one of the best presents you get this year.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

My mother, sister and I were in Port Orange, Florida the weekend of Reformation Sunday visiting my daughter, Nicole, and her fiancée. If you recall, that put us less than 24 hours into the aftermath of the horrific massacre that occurred at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh. The murder of two black elder citizens in a Kroger's grocery store had occurred only four days before. Multiple pipe bombs had been mailed to prominent progressive politicians and activists during that week.

We chose to attend worship services that Sunday at an ELCA Lutheran church nearby. I was shocked that the service proceeded beginning to end without a mention or reference to those disturbing events. As I shook the hand of the Pastor at the close of the service, he did not seem interested in conversation so I chose instead to send him an email the following day. I said, in part, the following:

How do Christians congregate in worship and prayer and take no notice of the devastating events of the past week? Even the Pittsburgh Steelers chose to take a moment of silence before their football game. How, at the very least, were there no prayers offered in support of the friends and families of those murdered while attending a regular weekly worship service of their own at a synagogue in Pittsburgh?

I ask this of you in particular because it was a day to celebrate the Reformation – a day when you extolled the “freedoms” which Martin Luther won for us. However, we cannot be blind to the legacy of anti-Semitism that Luther also left to us and I believe we are required to fight that legacy in a public and prayerful manner.

I go to church on a regular basis for many reasons, but chief among them is to increase my understanding of how to live as a Christian in this world. My church is not a silo and my faith feels meaningless unless it is connected intentionally to the good and the evil that exists around me. Luther's theology of the cross tells us unambiguously that God is present particularly in the dark and scary places in this world and God calls us to be there too. We missed a valuable opportunity on Sunday.

The following Sunday I was back home at House of Prayer. The passing of the peace that day was marked by a beautiful a capella refrain of the Hebrew word for peace – *Shalom*. Initiated without prior notification by Pastor, she led us in a reverential exchange of Christ's peace with each other. It was impossible to do so without meditating on the cruel events at Tree of Life. With that simple act, we tied ourselves to the larger community of believers. For me, it was a deeply moving experience.

I recall that Sunday in the aftermath of our celebration of Thanksgiving. My gratitude runs deep for this church and for our Pastor. I am grateful for each one of you as well.

OPPORTUNITIES TO SERVE – OKTOBERFEST 2019

Much of what I do is scheduling the meetings, taking notes, applying for permits, making sure we secure band, tent, alcohol, police detail etc. Believe me, all the people on the Committee know what their individual jobs entail and go about it without supervision, but bi-monthly meetings help to make sure that nothing falls through the cracks. I have timelines and notes and will work with a volunteer to get the job done in 2019. I will not be leaving the Oktoberfest Committee as I will help in other areas.

These four positions above need to be addressed and filled by March 2019. If we don't get any volunteers then the event will be in jeopardy, so please get in touch with myself or any member of the Committee to let us know of your interest.
