"I am happy because God is my power...God is my fire!" -Girma, Eritrean refugee in Calais, France.

March 2024's edition of *The Christian Century* featured an article by British photographer Alex Holmes, regarding the struggles of young Eritrean men at a refugee camp in Calais, France. These young men have gone through great hardship, not only in their perilous journey from Eritrea to France, but also the hard conditions of life for them in that Calais refugee camp. Seeking a better life has not exempted them from more suffering in the desired lands of opportunity. They are exposed to cold weather, unhygienic living spaces, daily violence and police evictions. At night, they seek the comfort of a firepit to resist the night's frozen embrace. Holmes captured the following words of one of the refugees named Girma:

"It's now ten years since I was at home in my village in Eritrea. We always had a fire outside our house. It was beautiful. On one side there were sheep, on the other cows, and children playing everywhere. We drank coffee and chatted around the fire... Calais life is hard. But I am always happy. I am happy because God is my power. [He pauses, his smile widening] **God is my fire!**"

How much we have to learn from our brother Girma! Even while facing such extreme circumstances, his joy in the midst of suffering is rooted in God, it is, as he says, the power that renews him in his difficult journey. This brought to my mind what propels our Easter faith. We have proclaimed with the whole church on Earth and in Heaven, Christ is risen indeed, Alleluia! Our faith, born from that Easter morning, calls us to the intimacy and enthusiasm of Girma's proclamation: "God is my fire!" We are to remember and be freed by the power of Christ's resurrection in our lives, a living flame that enlivens us to love and exist more deeply. During Easter, we claim God as our portion forever, the source of our happiness precisely because He has given His saving help. In Christ, we are forever brought close to God, we have the benefit of a comforting hearth in the midst of life's challenges.

We mainly gather as a church to receive and be with this One who is all our hope, grace and warmth. When we invite others, we invite them to this principal gathering, to rest in the eternal love present to us in the Risen Christ. He is our true power and fire indeed!

# Social Ministry Cathy Martin, Chair

**God's Work, Our Hands**: The cookie walk was held April 7. Funds raised went to the Weymouth Food Pantry. Pam Denholm, executive director of the Weymouth Food Pantry, is planning to come and speak to the congregation on April 21. This would be a rescheduled event from March 10 when Pam was sick. Thanks to all who baked and purchased cookies, and to the Sunday school children who decorated the bags. Leftovers will be brought to Father Bill's.

**Good Gifts**: The Social Ministry Committee is planning to promote backpacks filled with food from the ELCA Good Gifts catalog. The fee for the backpack is \$10.00. For June, Ann is planning to put together envelopes so that members can put their donation in the offering plate. This is to avoid any issues with donations and to make it clear how to proceed with donations.

**Migrant Family Support**: Supporting migrant families in Worcester is not efficient for a church on the South Shore. Carla has been in contact with the Family Welcome Center that is located in Quincy. There is a list of items in high demand for immigrants arriving in this country. The committee is planning to communicate this to the church members in May. We are also planning to invite someone from Eastern Nazarene College, where the immigrants are housed on school property, to come meet our members and discuss the needs of the center.

**Father Bill's Update**: Ann continues to organize monthly bag lunches. We are providing about 35 lunches each time thanks to the generosity of the congregation for donations. Father Bill's has an ongoing list of items including gift certificates needed for their visitors. They are building a new facility in Brockton, where we can try to be a sponsor. They are also looking for donations of breakfast items including cereal and oatmeal and casseroles which they can freeze. We discussed as in the past that we could provide an aluminum pan with a casserole recipe. We will announce this to the congregation in April to collect donations for the month.

**Habitat for Humanity**: In September, Ed and Nancy Martin with Kim Boyd are planning to work on a Habitat project in Kauai, Hawaii. The dates are September 28 through October 6. The cost is about \$1,700 per person excluding airfare. For more details, contact Ed Martin. We are also exploring reengaging with the local Habitat organization to see how we can support local projects either with food or cookies, etc. or offer some other support. They have started the new build in Cohasset and we may get involved in April with cookie donations.

**Wellspring**: HOP participated in providing 18 Easter dinner boxes in March – much like we do dinner boxes at Christmastime. (see pictures on next page). Gerda Hall donated \$25 toward an Easter box, which Kathleen used to cover part of the cost of an additional box. We are also looking into a bigger container for food donations.

**Ascentria**: School supplies collection for Ascentria will be happening in August.

# **Mutual Ministry Committee**

The Mutual Ministry Committee had its first meeting in February. Thank you to Cathy Martin, Steve Bergman, and Kathy Sutkowski for agreeing to join me on this important committee. To help you understand what the committee is about please see below a description of the purpose of the committee from HOP bylaws and excerpts from the ELCA Guidelines.

#### From our bylaws:

• The Pastor-Congregation Mutual Ministries Committee shall offer support and counsel for the pastor's ministry and provide a channel for communication between the pastor and this congregation concerning both the pastor's and the congregation's ministries. Its members shall serve as a sounding board for the pastor and as a resource for creative planning and conflict resolution.

#### From the guidelines:

• Affirming and strengthening the mission of the congregation and the ministry of the staff is the primary purpose of a Mutual Ministry Committee. This is done not through programs but through:

Listening and clarifying Sharing and communicating Reviewing and reflecting

• Committee members must remember that they are accountable to one another for maintaining discretion or confidentiality when personal information is shared. An important part of mutual ministry is how we handle sensitive information. Reports to the congregation council or the annual congregation

meeting summarize the work of the committee and state formal recommendations but need not disclose confidential items or detailed background information when the matters are personal. Let discretion be an important guide.

• A Mutual Ministry Committee will not change your pastor into "exactly what you want," but it will provide an arena for the two of you to define your differences and respect each other as partners in ministry. A Mutual Ministry Committee will not solve all personal problems for staff or members, but it will be a "safe place" for mutual conversation and consolation. A place of forgiveness, absolution and renewal.

Please feel free to speak with any committee member about a concern, a suggestion for change or a question. And importantly let us know what you are pleased about and appreciate! We will always recommend you speak with Pastor Emmanuel directly but will gladly bring things to his attention if you are unable or uncomfortable doing so. Please note, per ELCA guidelines, no information can be passed on anonymously.

## **Music Notes from Lenae**

How wonderful to have 80+ people in church on Palm/Passion Sunday!! I loved hearing the congregation really singing out on all the hymns and liturgy, and people seemed to catch on quickly to the new Palm Sunday hymns "Pave the Way with Branches" and "Blessed is the One" from our new hymnal supplement, "All Creation Sings", which are now in the pews! Yea! Many thanks to the Adult Choir for helping to lead those and lead the Procession with Palms!

By the time you read this, we will have had our somber Maundy Thursday service that commemorated the Last Supper & included a foot-washing, our very meaningful Tenebrae Good Friday service, where the sanctuary gets progressively darker after each reading, our Easter Vigil service, where participants helped to light up the darkened sanctuary with individual candles, then it took us on an abridged trip through the Bible, highlighting some of the major stories, and ending with a brief version of the Resurrection (be glad ours <u>doesn't</u> go on for 9 hrs. and bring the participants into Easter Morning at the sunrise!), and then our joyous Easter service, full of lilies, light and hundreds of sung Alleluia's! (If you haven't noticed, we don't sing Alleluias during Lent!) We'll continue to sing Alleluia's the next few Sundays as well, because they are a continuing of the Easter story.

Music is such an integral part of all of these services. It is amazing that some of the texts and tunes of the hymns have been around for centuries, and yet they still speak to us today! If you haven't ever noticed, at the bottom of the hymns in hymnals you are always given the writer's name and dates and the composer's name and dates, and I include this information in the bulletin as well. Make a note of which hymns have been around since the 9th century or earlier -- all the way up until hymns written in 2020! We have such a rich tradition of congregational singing in the Lutheran church! So now maybe you can sing them with even more knowledge of their origins! Take a look!
