"Now if you are unwilling to serve the LORD, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living, but as for me and my household, we will serve the LORD." Joshua 24:15

The above verse from the Book of Joshua has followed me throughout my life due to a memory of my grandparent's house in Puerto Rico. I remember as a kid when I would enter through their front door a small sign hanging on the left side of the entrance which reminded: "*Yo y mi casa serviremos al Señor*" (*As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord*). Without a doubt, this was a statement that was lived out in my grandparent's house. They passed on the faith, they lived the faith, their main motor of life was to serve Jesus Christ by serving others. This verse is a statement of commitment, of being covenanted to God in light of His abiding presence with His people. It stuck with me so deeply that I have also taken it to heart, wrapping my life and earthly commitments in awareness of what God has done for my family, of His love and mercy grounding how we lived and made decisions, and, of course, in how we reconciled and repented when we missed the mark.

As many commitments begin to take place in the Fall, like the beginning of the school year for many students, I have found it beneficial to think about how I make my life coherent in all its different facets. When I was a student, because of this essential God-relationship, I would try to dedicate my studies for the glory of God, if I was going to help somebody, it was to shine through with God's love for others, if I would play sports, that my excellence or my fun may bring greater glory to Him that made all these things possible. I think of this quote attributed to the Scottish runner Eric Liddell: "I believe God made me for a purpose, but He also made me fast. And when I run, I feel His pleasure".

That small message on my grandparent's entrance, provided me with a wealth of belonging, meaning, and gratitude; knowing the "why" of what I do with

Next Meeting: Sunday, October 20, 2024

Pastor recently delivered seven prayer shawls made by HOP members to **Ascentria Ruth House**. This is an ongoing project, and they will always welcome these handmade contributions.

Harvest: For the month of September, the committee is requesting members to bring in any produce and/or flowers to church for a mini farmers market. All the proceeds will go to item(s) from the ELCA Good Gifts catalog in memory of Rae Hall.

Migrant Family Support: Pastor has been partnering with the Rehoboth in Norwell where there are 15 families residing. Most are from Haiti but one family is from Peru. This shelter is under the Friends of the Homeless.

Father Bill's Update: Ann continues to organize monthly bag lunches. We will also be doing another bagged lunch on September 22nd which will be assembled after church with members. Kathleen was able to get a \$250 Thrivent grant which we will use to buy the supplies needed for the assembly of the 75 to 100 lunches .Voluteers needed!

Habitat for Humanity: In September, Ed and Nancy Martin with Kim Boyd are planning to work on a Habitat project in Kauai, Hawaii. The dates are September 28 through October 6. The cost is about \$1,700 per person excluding airfare. For more details, contact Ed Martin. The team will do a temple talk on October 20th to recap their trip.

The local Habitat is going through a transition. Once they get a new volunteer coordinator, we can see how we can support their ongoing projects.

Wellspring: We are collecting back to school supplies for September. We plan to do the Dinner boxes for the Christmas holidays. The committee decided that we would give people the option to do partial boxes and we will have an intergenerational event after church with members to wrap the boxes and assemble them for pick up by Wellspring right before the holiday. This could also be tied in to Advent event to make wreaths for the season. Dates to be determined. Please drop any paper boxes you have at the office.

Cookbook: The committee discussed resurrecting the cookbook that was published years ago. We have the original materials from the original publication plus additional cookbooks from past years. We also plan to add additional recipes from the cookie walk and the Ukrainian event. Music Notes from Lenae

Happy "Almost Fall" -

Hope everyone's had a good summer. I wanted to thank all the folks who jumped in on a Pick-Up Choir or trio or Men's Ensemble or Women's Ensemble (or played guitar or flute or violin!) in the last couple of months! I appreciate you all! We had some new participants this year, so extra appreciation to them! It's not easy to volunteer for something you haven't done before!

And speaking of that, if you enjoy singing, this is my yearly invitation to consider joining the Adult Choir! (actually you don't have to be a legal adult yet! Pre-teens and teens are welcome too!) Please see below a list of many reasons for singing in a choir!

I thought I'd ask for some feedback re: the hymns we've been singing from our new hymnal, "All Creation Sings". Have you liked them? Did you find them easy to sing or difficult to sing? Were you able to think about the words you were singing, or did you have to focus on singing the correct notes? Often, I've had the choir introduce a hymn as an anthem 1st, then have made it a congregational hymn at some point later in the year when it's appropriate to use it again. Other times I've had the choir sing the 1st verse of a new hymn, and have the congregation join on the 2nd verse. I have to say, you folks in the pews seem to catch onto things very quickly! Sometimes you're a bit timid on the 1st verse of something new, but then on the next verse I can hear your voices grow considerably louder! It's awesome! Not all congregations are like that! Many of the hymns in ACS are brand new in that hymnal. Do you find some of these new texts particularly meaningful? challenging? moving? (a couple have made me shed some tears because they hit close to home!), maybe relevant to today's world? Please share with me your impressions if you think of it!

I don't know if you always pay attention to the texts of the hymns, but it is usually the case that it was chosen for its relevance/connection to one of the scripture lessons, or maybe to a general "theme" of a worship service. When Pastor (and previous pastors!) and I choose hymns, we usually read through the scripture lessons for the day, and sometimes one or two appropriate hymns will pop right into our heads. If that doesn't happen, we usually check our Sundays and Seasons planning books to see some of the hymns suggested there. (I do appreciate this resource, as often they will have hymns listed that we haven't sung yet at HOP and I'll think "Oh! I never noticed this particular hymn had a reference to", and now they have wonderful suggestions of hymns in ACS that help give us confidence to give them a try!) Sometimes we scratch our heads and can't really see a connection to any of the lessons and we think "I wonder why they selected these hymns for this particular Sunday?" But it's a process, and when you've been singing hymns as long as I have (pretty much my whole life

once I learned how to read!) often a refrain or a particular reference to something will be "in my memory banks" but I can't quite remember which hymn has that phrase or theme. Then I have to do some searching, and it can drive me crazy if I can't find the hymn I'm thinking of! (Sometimes Pastor Henry and I would both be able to hum a particular hymn tune, but couldn't think what text we knew it with! Usually it would eventually come to one of us though!)

The Topical Index in the back of the hymnals is particularly useful when choosing hymns, but I have also made many scribbled additions to those lists in my own personal hymnals when I realize a hymn could fit a particular category, story or festival Sunday. I scribble things in when I'll realize "Oh, this is a good "Unity" hymn, or a good "Healing" hymn, or mentions a shepherd, but isn't listed under those headings in the index. I've created many of my own topical headings when the hymnal doesn't seem to have that particular subject. I write them in to help me remember to look at those hymns as well as the ones listed in a particular section. When considering a communion hymn, I love it when we can find one that has a verse or part of a verse that ties it not only to communion, but also to something else that's mentioned in one of the readings. In the actual hymn section I have made MANY notations above the titles of hymns to remind me right away that this one is good for an Old Testament reading, or Creation, or mentions a specific story like maybe the Prodigal Son, or the healing of someone, or casting out a demon, or a theme of love or service to others or following Jesus. I also underline in the texts themselves those phrases that mention a specific story, event, or theme. Then when I'm looking for a hymn with some specifics, I don't have to read through the whole text -- I can spot just those words or phrases right away that might make that hymn a perfect fit for a particular Sunday! (Some hymns are "loaded" - I might write about 10 different themes or stories above the title!)

Of course another huge part of a hymn is the TUNE. Sometimes people enjoy a particular hymn because they feel the melody is lovely, or it reminds them of hymns they sang as a child growing up. Some tunes actually come from Classical pieces of music! (Like "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee -- tune by Beethoven!) Many are based on folk songs from many different countries. Did you know that every hymn tune also has a meter? At the bottom right under every hymn you'll see a bunch of numbers. These refer to how many syllables are in a line of the text. (So "Amazing Grace" would be 8686, for example.) I bet most people have never thought about how many syllables they're singing, but thankfully hymnal editors do! Sometimes if we like a particular text, but feel the tune is odd, or a bit tricky to sing, we'll look in the Metrical Index to see if there's another tune with the same meter that might fit that particular text better.

So I hope maybe you learned some things about hymns and hymn selection that you didn't know before!

Welcome back to Sunday School, friends!

Our first day of Sunday School classes will be on Sept 15th. As you know, our space has gone through some changes with the preschool sharing our rooms. Our Godly Playroom has been included in the shared space. Have no fear, we will still have room for everyone to meet! We have worked out an agreement with Ivy Preschool for our materials to be able to be moved in and out of the rooms for the weekends. Godly Play is for children ages 3-grade 2. Grades 3-5 will be gathering first in the fellowship hall, and then we can move our group to either the classroom next to the kitchen or be at the end of the hallway outside the fellowship hall. We'll move to where it's best based on how many kids we have joining us. Anyone in grades 6 and up can meet with Phoebe starting in the fellowship hall by the sofa/chairs.

Keep in mind that any holiday weekends (like the upcoming Columbus Day/Indigenous People's Day weekend October 13) and BOTH ends of school vacation weeks there will be NO Sunday School. This gives our teachers a break, too!

Our confirmation program continues with some additions. Phoebe sent an email to the confirmation aged students asking what days/times might be best to gather once a month. Check your email and please respond to her with this information. Once we have the days and times that work for most, we will share that information with all of you, too. Here is a letter that Pastor shared with all the confirmation aged students:

To our new confirmands and their families,

As the new school year begins, we would also like to give a fresh start to our confirmation program at House of Prayer. Confirmation is a beautiful tradition in the church by which those baptized have an opportunity to deepen their knowledge and thus be empowered to make a public affirmation of their faith alongside the community of believers. It is my prayer that our new confirmation class may prove to be an enriching time together, learning more about God and all the big questions about what it means to be a Christian.

Traditional programs normally run on a 2 year schedule, and that is the commitment I'm expecting we all make in regards to our program. It will be divided into 4 semesters that run parallel to the school year. We will meet once a month for 1 hour sessions. I am completely

aware that schedules can be overbooked during the school year, which is why I sincerely ask that these sessions be considered a priority. We also encourage regular attendance at Sunday worship, alongside contributing to the workings of the community (examples: acolyting, ushering, coffee hour, music and worship, etc). We seek to be immersed in a way of life rooted in Jesus!

The program is focused on 4 main subjects per semester, based on the Collaborate Lutheran Confirmation curriculum: 1st Semester: Old Testament, 2nd Semester: New Testament, 3rd Semester: Lutheran History and Catechism, 4th Semester: Lutheran Living/Christian living. Aside from class sessions, I hope to include outings where we can visit sites of other religious traditions so we can expand our religious literacy, spiritual retreats, Confirmation Camp at Camp Calumet in New Hampshire, among other ideas. I pray this might be a fruitful time together, and we can't go on without your prayers. Pray that the Holy Spirit may open our hearts to faith, joy, and understanding!
